# Singing the Blues!



Sunday the 30th July saw the brilliantly successful MUSICAL GARDEN PARTY take place at Knapton Hall. Thanks to the enthusiasm and generosity of Steve and Carol, their immaculate walled garden was transformed into a festival venue for an afternoon and evening of live music. A special mention must also go to Geoff Cooper who not only brought the event into existence but drummed with both bands.

3 Cornered Wheel took to the stage with Simon Whitney on guitar, harp and vocals, Martin York on bass, and Geoff on drums. Under an unexpected blue sky, their 'fresh approach to classic blues' (2017 Dereham Blues Festival programme) brought the first of many wholehearted bursts of applause.









Geoff then changed shirts and changed bands to join Chicago One Zero with Richard "Buzz" Barsby on vocals and guitar, Johnboy Watcham on harp, Terry 'the Professor" Bunting on guitar and "Steaming Stewart Aitken on bass. # Easy access walks this autumn

The Norfolk Coast Partnership has produced a range of fourteen information sheets on accessible walks in the Norfolk Coast Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). The walk information has been developed in order to give everyone the confidence to get out and enjoy this special place. All the routes are short (½ to 1½ miles), start and finish near car parks with accessible toilets, offer frequent seating opportunities and are well waymarked, they also offer the opportunity for everyone to discover special parts of the area. The information sheet also contains photos of things to look out for, the waymarkers to follow and the terrain of the route in order that you can judge for yourself if it is suitable for you. Suitable for everyone from wheelchair users to families with pushchairs and the elderly.

# Obituary - Denis Haynes

Saying a fond farewell to two
Knapton residents



Denis was born in Walthamstow on 17 August 1927. He had three brothers and one sister. Educated at the local schools, Denis left at 14 in 1941.

A volunteer in the R.A.F. Regiment, he was sent to Aden and the middle- East where, as a member of the R.A.F. Regiment, he guarded British airfields.

Denis and Vi married on 6 October 1952 at the local registry office. They went on to have two daughters – Carol and Michelle- 4 grandchildren Carrie, Lauren, Donna and Michael – and 7 great grandchildren.

Denis was a member of Knapton Village Hall Management Committee, knew the building intimately, and painted the walls and exterior several times.

Denis began the Knapton Village Art Class in 1984. They met to work together and staged an exhibition each year until very recently. He also taught at the Bacton Art Group.

A month or so ago he spent time in the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital, a day or more in Halvergate House in North Walsham and a few days supported at home by Vi, professional carers and neighbours until his death on 28 September. He died where he wished, just after his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday, and shortly before his 65<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary.

# Obituary - Clyte Venvell

Last month we said goodbye to another long-standing village resident, Clyte Venvell. Clyte was born in Norwich and attended Blythe School in the city.

From the age of 15 she became Clyte from the Greek legends : Clytemnestra the wife of Agamemnon.

After leaving school, she studied at Homerton College Cambridge. Teaching was her life. She worked up to the age of 73, in Yorkshire, London (near Dulwich as Head of a large comprehensive school (1500 pupils) and Norfolk. She also wrote books on sex education.

Clyte and her husband Don moved back to Norfolk in the 1980s to be near Don's mother then later moving into the house built in the garden in Knapton. Her husband Don was significant in county, district and local council and they worked hard together. They encouraged a local candidate MP to stand again – who's still in post today. Clyte served on Knapton Parish Council and she supported Don as churchwarden & organist (sometimes literally when Don became too poorly to walk unaided).



However, her life was not all work. Clyte loved America, especially Martha's Vineyard and she had lots of friends. She was keen on amateur dramatics and was a member of Conisford Players. She enjoyed riding, hiking and sailing. One of her students told her 'everyone knows you're blinking mad' this being a reference to her doing extreme things! She could come across as stubborn, and she liked a good discussion/argument. She was strong and persistent, loving and passionate.

The last five years were difficult ones for Clyte, with Don's death and her failing health. More recently she required full time care, with her body failing but her mind as sharp as a pin.

# A TRIBUTE FROM CLYTE'S GREAT NIECE, GEORGIA

I'm very fortunate to have had such an amazing woman as my great aunt. She was, and always will be, an important role model in my life. Her attitude to many things may have been seen stubborn, but she was strong and persistent. Clyte has given me a view on life that anything is possible, even as a woman, if you set your mind to it.

I will always treasure the times we spent together, though few, and they will forever mean a great deal to me. My favourite things were her stories. Clyte had such a fulfilled life, she was always up to all sorts, even from a young age. I am reminded of a story she told me from when she was at school of the time she had her prefects badge unjustly (according to her) taken away for misbehaving. She triumphantly got her teachers back later, when she was needed for a duty, something which she technically no longer had to do as she was no longer a prefect, and so therefore she didn't do it. When asked about her absence after, she smugly reminded her teachers of her change in roles - much to her delight! Little did she know that, after all her misbehaving, she would be back there years later, teaching at the same school .....

Education was such a big part of her life and I am happy to have shared this with her. We both had an interest in Psychology, which we often discussed together, as well as looking through her vast collection of books in that area. It's a shame that she won't be present in the next step of my education, or my sister's, but I know that she'll be watching over all of us during these times.

We will all miss her so much but are happy that she is now reunited with others close to her.

# The Bells, The Bells!

We pass the church tower every day, we see the clock, and hear it every hour, and we hear the bells. But what makes it work and who gets them to ring? I set out to investigate and expected to encounter pallid, spectral, figures given to flitting about the graveyard in the half light, before creeping back to their lair somewhere up the tower. It wasn't quite like that. Enter Andrew Lubbock.

Andrew has lived in Knapton all his life and has been Tower Captain since 1992 when he took over from his uncle Gordon Lubbock who had been captain since the 1960's. Andrew is responsible for the clock and the bells and bellringing.

The clock is electrical and dates back to about 1946. Its face is about six feet across and it chimes each hour. There was a long gap during the recent protracted period of restoration to the tower when it was out of commission, but after a great deal of work by Andrew it is running again, and it's very accurate indeed. Compare the first chime with the pips on the radio and you will see.



But the bells take up most of his time. There are six of them in a scale from 'doe' to 'fa'. They date variously from 1565, to three bells from 1932 which replaced three from 1800. The final sixth bell was installed in 1992 and was a gift from a former Knapton Villager called Dorothy Margetts. Uncle Gordon taught many local residents to ring, including Andrew and no less than twelve other members of his family.

Presently there are seven regular ringers in Knapton and they are all members of the Diocesan Association of Ringers. As such they muck in (Andrew's words) with other local churches, notably Paston, Gimingham and Southrepps. Not Trunch, for sadly Trunch's bells are unringable. They ring for services where possible, weddings, special events and sometimes, if asked, for funerals. For funerals one side of the clapper is muffled. This gives one open row of changes followed by a quieter, more solemn, sounding row. This is also done on Remembrance Sunday.

Is it easy to be a bell ringer, I wondered? Well, up in the tower he made it look easy. But it takes a lot of instruction and practice. Which is why we hear bell practice on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Mondays of each month, between 7.30 and 9.00pm. It's not just about playing scales up and down. There are 720 permutations on six bells but these can be rung in hundreds of different ways, called 'methods'. Methods all have different names, frequently place names.

The clapper strikes the bell about one and a half seconds after the rope is pulled. Andrew explains that in Knapton's case all six bells sound, in turn, about 30 changes a minute. This means that the ringers have to strike their bell in a gap of two thirds of a second. And to be and sound accurate they have to strike the bell within a twelfth of a second each time. Skillful or what?

The bell itself can weigh up to four tons (Liverpool Cathedral) Most Norfolk 'sixes' have tenor bells weighing half a ton. The biggest at Knapton weighs 5.5cwt. The bell is fixed to and hangs from a shaft known as a headstock. Beside the bell on the headstock is fixed what looks like a small cartwheel. A rope is tied to one of the spokes of the wheel and drops down to where the ringers are. Pull the rope, the wheel and the bell rotate one way and the clapper hits the bell. Gravity causes the bell and the wheel to drop back and go up the other side, with a little further pull on the rope. Bong, again. There is a cunning piece of wood extending at 180 degrees from the top of the bell which, by a crafty buffer known as the stay/slider, prevents the bell going over the top and down the other side. Using this the ringer can halt the bell when it is just past being upside down. Otherwise, during ringing, the ringer can pause the bell by gently holding the rope when the bell is literally upside down. But if the ringer gets it wrong and allows the bell to rotate beyond the vertical with too much force, the stay/slider snaps and the bell rotates through 360 degrees leading to the bell rope flying upwards. Taking the ringer with it if he has decided not to let go!

What was very clear was that the ringers seem to have a lot of fun, not only in Knapton but at all the churches they visit. Ringers are welcomed in every church and Andrew tells me that any ringer passing any church where the bells are ringing is always a welcome guest and invited to have a go. He says it is by no means as daunting as it may sound.

Knapton would welcome more ringers. Andrew is keen to help and teach. And like so many people I have talked to about these little articles, his enthusiasm is infectious. There is no age limit, although he says children are quicker learners than their parents! But there is a pretty steep wooden stairway to the belfry which requires some agility.

So why not give it a try? Either just turn up at the tower and go up the stair while the bells are ringing on a Monday or call Andrew on 01263 722929


