

# Residents win "significant improvements" in Millennium Field Campaign

North Norfolk District Council has granted planning permission to develop Knapton's Millennium Field, but a campaign by local residents forced developer Victory Housing to make "significant improvements" to the plans.

In a controversial decision, planners approved the scheme despite refusing permission for a similar development in nearby Southrepps - a village specifically earmarked for new housing estates.



The Knapton residents' campaign forced a reduction in the number of houses from 16 to 14, and design changes to reduce the visual impact of the development and to reflect the traditional brick and flint heritage of the area.

An archeological survey was also undertaken, which reportedly uncovered some interesting artefacts. We hope to have more information for the next edition of The Knapton News.

## **Knapton's Millennium Field Update**

Knapton residents spoke at the North Norfolk District Council's Planning Committee in May, to voice their objections to the Victory housing Planning application for development of the Millennium Field.

Angus Roberts spoke about the villagers concerns with the extra traffic which would result from the development; Mark Herbert-Oakey spoke about the impact the development would have on parking for School Close; Michelle de Vries told Councillors that many villagers were unhappy with the design of the buildings and highlighted ambulance and fire engine accessibility concerns; and Parish Council Leader Alan Young, explained the many issues that had been raised in his village hall meetings with residents.

A representative of developer Victory Housing Trust spoke in favour of the scheme, and then the committee voted. The scheme was passed by 8 votes to 5, and residents have no right of appeal.

However, during the debate a number of changes to the plans were demanded by councillors in response to objections raised by residents.

Furthermore, a fresh consultation will now be launched on the design of the buildings.

## Concessions won included:

- 1. The red brick wall surrounding the property proposed by Victory Housing Trust be replaced with a brick and flint wall on the Hall Lane side
- 2. The hedge surrounding the site will be kept rather than being removed as proposed by Victory.
- 3. The height of two key buildings will be substantially reduced so that impact on the village is lessened.
- 4. Brick and flint panels will be added to the buildings opposite Hall Lane
- 5. The trees planted in memory of loved ones will be kept
- 6. A further design consultation will be held before full consent is given.

The Parish Council will continue to work on villagers behalf and will be meeting with both Victory Housing Trust and the Architects to try to encourage further design changes and are also consulting with Highways and The Norfolk Fire Department regarding traffic, parking and safety issues.

Councillors also ordered that an archeological surgery be undertaken. This has now occurred and the results have been sent to NNDC for review....

...Residents spoke to the surveyors while they were on site, and apparently some interesting artefacts have been uncovered!

Parish Council leader Alan Young said,

"I'd like to thank all the residents of Knapton for their hard work during the Millennium Field campaign.

While the result isn't the start-over we had hoped for, we have won some important concessions, which will mean significant improvements in the development.

We didn't have it all our own way, but we now have a much better plan in place, with the possibility of further changes in the new consultationAs ever, we have reached a compromise, and I hope it is one that residents feel they can live with

## What is a Sea Fret ?

As residents will know Knapton has recently been shrouded in a rare and beautiful mist which locals call a Sea Fret!

Collins dictionary defines a sea fret simply as a wet mist or haze coming in from the sea.

It is usually found in North East England (where is is called a haar), but can occasionally affect areas of East Anglia.

The fret occurs when a pocket of warm air passes over the colder sea, and the moisture in the air starts to condense

forming a fog. A breath of wind can blow it inland and a beautiful mist then develops.

Morning sunshine will usually burn a fret away, but occasionally it can last all day causing a ghostly pea-souper like the one captured here!

## **OUR VILLAGE HALL**

Things are changing at our village hall. For years we have made do with what we had, and our income was barely sufficient to make ends meet. The Parish Council were lukewarm in their support for a hall at all and it was difficult to attract hirers

But this year I'm delighted to say, following successful events last year, saw the beginnings of real improvements.

We started by sealing the Northern wall, outside and in, and repainting it. We then enlisted the wonderful help of Community Service, now known as Community Payback, to do a complete internal paint job. For six days a team of six worked like beavers to clean down, prepare and then paint all the internal walls and woodwork and have produced a result which has transformed it. Not least it has also given us an opportunity to remove ageing curtains and clear the accumulated pictures and other material from the walls.

In June the Community Payback team will be returning in order to paint outside, the wc's and generally touch up bits that require further attention. The kitchen, which already benefits from new units, will be finished off. And the back yard has been cleared, thanks to a skip which we hired.

We have also disposed of all the plastic chairs that were forever getting in the way with their splayed legs. They are replaced with three sets of much more comfortable, solid, chairs thanks to

the generosity of their earlier owners. And we have decided that it will no longer be necessary for hall users to stack everything back onto the stage after every session. Chairs may be left at the perimeters of the hall and at least three or four tables will stay 'up'

Of course all of this could not have been achieved without the enormous help of our committee who have scraped, cut, sealed, stuck, painted, humped, carried, fed, shopped with wonderful determination and humour. My thanks, on behalf of the village, go to all of them.

So, remember. This is your hall. Come and look round it. Use it or lose it! It can be hired for surprisingly little! Mary Renwick-Forster is our diary supremo. Call her and the hall can be yours. Just ring me on 01263 720356 and I can open it up for you so that you can see what it offers.

The leader of Norfolk's Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, Mr Peter Evans gave a presentation to Councillors at the June Parish Council Meeting. Residents and Councillors were told that Neighbourhood Watch is the largest voluntary movement in Great Britain and its aims are to bring communities together as well as keeping communities safe from crime.

Knapton Parish Council voted in favour to adopt the Scheme and there is no cost involved except for the purchase of Neighbourhood Watch signs at £15 each,. Knapton residents are now encouraged to join as individual members. There is no fee to join, and members receive numerous benefits, including free advice on security, a window sticker, and a 10% reduction in home insurance from the Co-Op.

This was always a "done deal" between Victory Housing Trust and NNDC with the land set aside for social housing since the 1950's. You can draw your own conclusions as to why Knapton was approved and Southrepps rejected, but major concessions were won which will improve the design enormously and will save the hedgerow and trees for future generations and wildlife to enjoy. We hope that Victory Housing Trust will stick to the Planning recommendations and build a development which will bring young people into the village and make a positive contribution to Knapton. **Michelle and Liz (Editors)**
