

Knapton Parish Council - Chairman's Report

I hope that as you're reading this you're feeling safe and well.

As we've lurched from a Covid crisis to a Cost-of-Living crisis the one constant has been your parish councillor's unswerving dedication to making things better. I would like to thank each one of them for not flinching in their efforts to continually work to improve our everyday lives despite the very challenging circumstances we all faced.

We have a strong council, full of leaders, which is reflected in what they have done since the last elections in May, including 3000 trees planted around the parish, various children's events, Anglian Sewerage system and County Broadband services shadowed, new bins added and a lot more.

Conversely, I've lost count of the number of times I, and the parish council, have been frustrated in our efforts by NNDC, from junction issues in School Close to a variety of planning issues. They even took our phone box! I guess that having a District Councillor (who's supposed to turn up to meetings occasionally and keep us informed of NNDC actions) living in Wales hasn't helped.

But in just under two months' time, on 4th May, we all get the chance to vote for whoever we think will best represent our parish and fight our corner at the District Council for the next four years. The outcome of the election will not affect national Government, that's next year's election, but it could make a real difference to each one of us and to our Parish Council's efforts to further improve our roads, road safety, bus services and a host of other things. So please take the time to vote and exercise your right to choose. However, those same elections will be tinged with sadness as both our Parish Clerk and the most senior member of the council will be retiring..

- Dee Holroyd has kept the council on the straight and narrow for over 11 years, guiding and supporting the council at every turn, working tirelessly for the good of our parish and all those who live in it.
- Pat Lee is a force of nature and shows his consideration and compassion for others every single day, as "Stuart's Bench" demonstrated so clearly. His level-headed and common-sense approach has been an inspiration to the council for around 30 years.

The commendable loyalty shown by both will not be easily replaced and they will both be sorely missed. So, reluctantly the council needs to fill their shoes. I hope that the rejuvenated community spirit within the parish will encourage those who don't normally get involved to offer a lending hand as we continue to strive to make where we live as safe and as wonderful as possible, and I look forward to seeing you at one of our events during the year.

Knapton Parish Plan 2023

The 2008 Knapton Village Plan was a great piece of work.

Taking well over a year to produce, it was well researched, took contributions from many residents, groups and organisations from around the parish and it set priorities and objectives for the Parish Council to pursue in the years that followed.

A Village / Parish Plan should be reviewed at least every five years or so to evaluate its progress, but Knapton's has never been reviewed so I feel that it's time it was because the actions that came out of it around fourteen years ago are now either completed or are in dire need of updating.

A Parish Plan should determine the future of a community and I believe that for ours to be credible it must include the thoughts and views of everyone that lives here, so I will ensure that every resident within the parish has the opportunity to voice their opinion and be heard.

In May, at the first Parish Council meeting of the new term, I will take the necessary steps to setup a Steering Group to be led by Councillor John Lawton, which will oversee and drive this parish-wide project. Although led by the Parish Council, I would like to see it comprise of members of the Parish Council, Village Hall and Fête committees, the Church, MADRA, local clubs & groups and residents of the parish.

Let's all be part of something good, and get it done.

The Church needs to be used for worship and prayer and offer a quiet space for all of course but also as a community space to be shared by all. Therefore we need some change. Now change is not always easy for everybody to accept or desire but throughout the centuries I am sure Knapton Church has seen many changes some good, some not so. The Bells of St Peter and St Paul's Parish Church Knapton

The Church of St Peter and St Paul is very fortunate to possess an excellent ring of 6 bells, hung for English style "Full Circle" ringing.

The largest bell (tenor) weighs approximately 5.5 cwt (280 kgs) which actually makes them a "light" ring of bells and hence relatively easy to ring. Two of the bells (5 and 6) date from the middle of the 16th century and were cast by Norwich bell founder John Brand. It is possible that they were actually cast in the church-yard or a nearby field as many bells at this time were cast "on site".

Bells 2, 3, and 4 were recast by Gillett and Johnson of Croydon, in 1932 from three 19th century (Mears of London) bells. The bells were returning in a new steel and cast-iron frame to replace the original wooden structure which had become very unstable due, mainly to neglect and the fact that the rainwater poured through the leaking Tower roof. The bells had not been rung for at least 50 years prior to this restoration. The "new" treble bell (Whitechapel Bell Foundry) dated 1990 was the generous gift of former Knapton resident and Bell ringer Miss Dorothy Margett, which she gave in memory of her Godfather.

Happy New Growing 2023 to you all,

The weather was lovely for February, but Spring is now officially here.

The snowdrops are looking amazing but they will be over soon , the

daffodils are just bursting and so are the primroses. But we must not forget the birds ,they need building up for breeding .

It is time to plant seeds, peppers and chillies with help from a bit of warmth, for the greenhouses, tomatoes a bit later as they will get too drawn. Also all our greens as they need a long growing season. Your potatoes should all be in old egg boxes chitting ready for planting. Don't forget the flower seeds, to bring all the bees into our gardens and allotments to pollinate the apples and all our fruit bushes. We have three new allotment holders this year and am looking forward to seeing if there are any new ideas for us oldens , we are always interested in learning new things.

I hope our weather is better this year, all our watering is good but nothing can beat a good drop of rain. Hopefully it won't be so hot this year, although the tomatoes loved it, we are still eating the produce from last year, the freezers were full but we are gradually eating our way through it all.

So it's good growing to you all, as this is a very exciting time of the year .Oh! the carrots my husband grew in pots were a winner, we had lovely sweet carrots during the winter, yummy!
